This training will prepare participants and their organisations to respond to the emotional aftermath of crisis, whether few or many are involved.

Learning Objectives

To gain an understanding of the nature of crisis and trauma from the perspective of the type of incident as well as the immediate and long-term impacts on the individual and community.

- ✦ To explore the issues of loss in death and dying as it relates to trauma.
- ✦ To gain an understanding of issues of age, culture and spirituality in responding to trauma.
- ✦ To learn crisis intervention, death notification, post-trauma counselling, group crisis intervention and crisis response coordination processes and skills.
- ✦ To practice individual and group crisis intervention and community response coordination skills.
- ✦ To learn about the impact of responding to crisis on the caregiver.

Certificate of Completion

Upon successful completion, a certificate of completion will be issued by National Organization for Victim Assistance (NOVA), USA. To obtain the certificate by NOVA, each participant has to complete 100% attendance of the three-day training. Absence from attendance due to reasons like illness, work, family obligations, and other valid reasons will still be considered as being absent and will count towards the total time absent.
